As you will be aware, this summer term we are participating in an exciting project called 'Coast to Country'. All 19 Deeside schools agreed that the aims of this project are to: Inspire our whole school community to be 'A PART' of our world.

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- PROTECT the local environment, the animals around the world who need our help, future generations.

- TOGETHER as a school, as a community, as global citizens.

As part of this project, the children have been considering what we all, as a community, can do to help the world around us. I have been meeting weekly with our School Council and Eco Team to discuss what we can do at Gayton to raise people's awareness as well as make small changes for a positive impact. Already they have challenged us all to consider the containers and wrappers we use for our snacks and lunch boxes. Can we reduce the use of plastics, especially single use plastics? They have begun a crisp packet recycling station in the dinner hall. We have already filled one box. Who knew we liked so many crisps with our lunches. They have also set us a challenge. We know we should have a water bottle in school, especially during the warm days, but are will all able to use a reusable bottle, such as a metal flask? They have shared these important messages and challenges in our assemblies. Thank you to all of the children who have made suggestions and who have been a voice at these meetings – you are making a difference!

The whole school have begun to learn more about the world around us as part of our C2C project. Some have been learning all about the Marsh Harrier and the vulnerable reed beds just down the road from us in Neston; others have been exploring high quality stories, such as 'Yucky Worms!', 'The Bee Who Spoke' and 'Floodland' to understand how important our environment is and how we can help to take care of it.

Many different art projects are under way too. Later in the term, parents will have an opportunity to come and visit school to see all of the wonderful work the children are producing so they can show you and tell you all they have learnt.
